
Suddenly a BOOM shook the ground. "That sounds like thunder," said Bunnie Rabbot.


said. "Take your overgrown toy and go back inside Robotropolis!"

"We won't let you kill the forest!" said Bunnie.


"My Swatbots and Buzzbombers will see to it that you don't interfere," Robotnik roared. Sure enough, they began to chase the Freedom Fighters.






"There's way too many of them!" Antoine said. "I suggest a hasty retreat."

"We want to make a deal, Robotnik," Sonic said. "If you stop building the wall, we'll give you this chest of Golden Rings."




"It could be a trick," Snively whispered to Robotnik.
